

Definition of RTI

RTI is a multi-step approach to providing services and interventions to students whose academic and behavioral needs are not being met through the core curriculum.

RTI's intent is to provide ongoing assessment of students' learning and ongoing support or enhancement of instructional needs that are not being met through the core curriculum.

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Core Vocabulary

“Every Ed”: Each child in every school is the responsibility of every staff member within the school and district.

Intervention: An additional instruction for students in an area of learning or behavioral difficulty to try to improve performance and achieve adequate progress.

Universal Screening: An assessment tool used to determine students who will need further instructional interventions beyond the core curriculum.

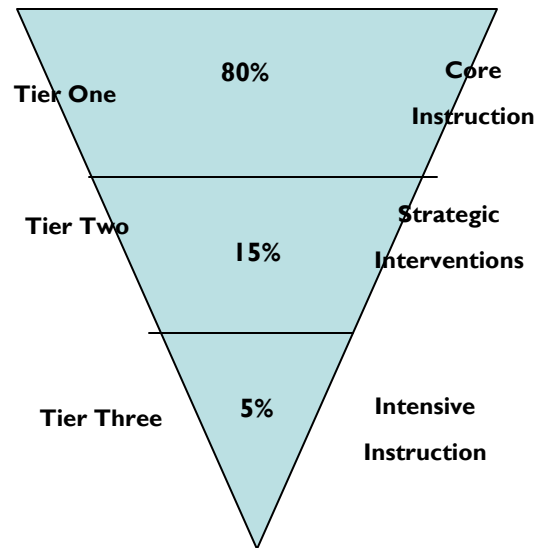
Diagnostic Testing: An in-depth assessment that focuses on students’ achievement in core content areas which provides guidance for interventions.

Progress Monitoring: A scientifically-based process used to assess students’ academic performance and evaluate the effectiveness of instruction and/or interventions.



A THREE-TIERED MODEL FOR SUCCESS

- Tier One: All students assessed and instructed using best practices in the core classroom.
- Tier Two: Students in need of further instruction; either remedial or gifted, will receive strategic research-based interventions in addition to core classroom instruction, with periodic progress monitoring.
- Tier Three: Identified students will receive intensive interventions, either in remediation or gifted, in addition to core classroom instruction with more frequent progress monitoring.



How can RTI benefit my child?

A primary concern of parents, as well as teachers, is how to help children successfully learn and apply academic skills in school that enhance their learning level. Response to Intervention (RTI) is able to assist students by:

- Collecting multiple data points for every child to guide learning experiences
- Providing instructional interventions of increasing levels of intensity that have been proven to be effective for students to remediate or enhance their learning levels
- Monitoring student’s “rate of improvement” on a selected intervention
- Identifying students that need further assistance and providing timely and specific assistance in the area of need
- Identifying students that need further enhancement and challenge instruction beyond the core classroom
